Create a timeline of deadlines to stay on track!

BE YOURSELF!

- Don't be afraid to be yourself. Your essays should represent who you are!
- Be passionate about your interests and your goals.

WHAT WE WANT TO KNOW

- Who are you? What is your narrative? How have your lived experiences shaped who you are, your perspective, and the decisions you make?
- Why do you want to go to college? What motivates you?
- What are your short-term and long-term goals? What steps are you taking to reach them?
- How are your goals related to your plans to give back to the community when you are finished with school?

RECOMMENDATION LETTER

- The recommender should be able to speak about you in a positive manner.
- Provide a resume or list of activities to your recommender.
- Meet with your recommender and give them the opportunity to ask questions and get to know you better.
- Choose a recommender that is able to highlight not only your accomplishments, but also your personality, motivations for education, passions, and character.
- Give the recommender enough time to write a strong letter (i.e. at minimum two weeks)!
- Have a second recommender ready as a back-up.

SOME FOOD FOR THOUGHT!

- Who are your biggest advocates? How did they support you?
- What are some resources you've used to support your goals?
- Who/what is the driving force behind your current and future successes?

ORGANIZATION IS KEY!

- Make an outline of your essays.
- Use specific examples.
- Make sure you answer every part of the question.
- Have friends, family members, educators, and mentors look over your application.
- Quality over quantity.

ASK YOURSELF, "WHY?"

Think about what APIASF & GMS will learn about you from your essays. For example:

- Why did you choose to be a member of an organization? What skills did you develop? And what did you learn about yourself? Or, if you couldn't join an organization, what were your other obligations?
- Why did you choose to take the classes you did? Were you challenging yourself with a harder class and/or a new subject? Were there other factors that influenced your choices?
